### *Notes for Contributors*

1. All articles and correspondence should be sent to [african.affairs.editors@gmail.com](mailto:african.affairs.editors@gmail.com); if electronic submission is not possible, please send to Dr. Sara Rich Dorman, University of Edinburgh, 15 A George Square, Edinburgh, EH8 9LD, UK.
2. Articles should not be more than 8,000 words in length, including footnotes, and typed in double spacing, preferably in Microsoft Word or a compatible format. Contributors without access to electronic mail should submit three double-spaced copies on A4 paper, plus a copy on computer disk. Manuscripts are not usually returned to authors. They should be original contributions and should not be submitted to another publication simultaneously. Additional advice on style and structure can be found at <http://afraf.oupjournals.org>.
3. Articles should be accompanied by an abstract of not more than 200 words, typed on a separate page, indicating the major argument of the article and its significance as an addition to existing knowledge or analysis.
4. Manuscripts should be anonymized, please do not include any information or contact details for authors on the submitted article. Some limited information may be attached in a cover letter or email, if desired. It is helpful if authors can provide an additional email addresses or a phone number in case of difficulties in communication.
5. *Main text.* Broad divisions in the text should be indicated, and sub-headings supplied where appropriate. Sub-headings, book titles and foreign words should be italicised (indicated by single underlining). Single quotation marks should be used for main quotations, double marks for any included within the main quotation. Quotations of more than 40 words should be indented and single spaced. Dates should be given thus: 21 March; 1 April 1960; Thursday, 30 January 1960. Numerals up to ten should be spelled out, higher numbers normally given in figures. Percent should be spelled out.
6. *Spelling.* The journal follows the first preference spellings in the Oxford English Dictionary, thus 'z', in words such as 'criticize', 'organization', 'radicalize', etc; and always English-English, thus cheque *not* check, labour *not* labor, and programme *not* program, etc.
7. *Footnotes.* These will be printed in the journal at the foot of each page. In the manuscript, however, they should be submitted on a separate sheet, numbered consecutively throughout, double spaced and no smaller than font size 12.
8. *Bibliographical references.* Titles of books and names of journals should be italicised. The place of publication, publisher and date of books should be given. Titles of articles should be in quotation marks. The overall form is shown in the example below

In second and subsequent references, the author's surname only and the short title of the book or article should be used, e.g. Kjekshus, *Ecology Control*, p. 101 or Grundy, 'Nkrumah's theory of underdevelopment', pp. 454–5. This means that *op. cit.* and *loc. cit.* should not be used.
9. *Tables and Diagrams.* These should be used in moderation and each set out on a separate sheet of paper. Their proposed position in the text should be clearly indicated, and will be adhered to wherever practicable. Tables should be set out so as to avoid the use of rules, particularly vertical ones. Diagrams should be approximately twice the size of the finished block.
10. *Proofs.* Proofs of articles will be sent as pdfs (by post if necessary) to contributors wherever practicable. This cannot be guaranteed, however, nor can printing schedules be held up to wait for authors' corrections, for whatever reason these may be delayed. Authors' alterations in proof, other than the correction of printer's errors, may be disallowed or charged to authors.
11. African Affairs has a preference for reviewing works of scholarship. Personal memoirs, unless by person of great historical significance, are unlikely to be sent to review. We regret that we are unable to return un-reviewed books to the sender.
